
#### Braille Books for Blind Children Program

The winner of the 2020 Kenneth Jernigan Scholarship was Precious Perez who is studying music therapy

"I'm a vocalist, songwriter, and music educator. I'm a first-generation college student from a low-income Puerto Rican family. I'm the first blind student to study music education at Berkeley and the first blind student to study abroad at a Valencia [College] campus. My goal is to break down barriers for blind educators and performers to lead by example in the mainstream setting. I represent multiple communities, so I will strive to teach my students beauty and diversity. 
#### **Celebrating Over 100 Years!**
